About the Stop Out Survey

Every summer, the Office of Assessment at North Carolina State University (NCSU) e-mails a survey to students who were enrolled at NCSU during the previous school year, but did not reenroll for the following academic semester. Students leave college for a variety of reasons, and the Stop Out Survey seeks to gain a better understanding of why our students decide to disenroll.

The 2018 Stop Out sample consisted of 1155 students. Approximately 6.23% (72 of 1155) of the students in the 2018 Stop Out sample submitted a complete or partial response. The following is a summary of the results of that survey. The questions provided students with a list of reasons regarding why they may have decided to leave. Students were asked to rank the effect of each particular reason on their decision to dis-enroll. They were also provided space to share reasons that may not have been on the pre-populated list. Students were asked to name any office or person on campus they may have reached out to for assistance with their decision. Other factors were addressed as well, including employment status while at NCSU, future plans to continue their postsecondary education, and overall experience while enrolled.

Survey Highlights

*Summary highlights regarding 2018 Stop Out respondents' decisions not to enroll in Fall 2018 include relatively high frequencies of moderate ("Somewhat") to strong ("A Great Deal") personal, environmental, social, and academic influential factors.

- Approximately 40.3% of survey respondents noted the desire to "transfer to another institution" as a moderate to strong influence on their decision not to enroll.
- Approximately 31.9% of survey respondents indicated feelings of loneliness or isolation as an influential factor in their decision not to enroll, as indicated by choices of "A Great Deal" or "Somewhat".
- Approximately 29.2% of survey respondents selected "A Great Deal" or "Somewhat" in regards to **financial reasons** influencing their decision not to enroll.
- Approximately 29.2% of survey respondents selected "A Great Deal" or "Somewhat" in regards to dissatisfaction with academic performance influencing their decision not to enroll.

Notably, **approximately 84.7% of survey respondents** indicated that they "Strongly Agree" or "Somewhat Agree" with the statement "I could succeed at NC State". In addition, **approximately 45.8% of survey respondents** were considering returning to NC State.




Figure 1. Gender Proportions for 2018 Stop Out Respondents, Stop Out Population and NCSU Undergraduate Population.

The gender percentages seen above show unequal proportions across populations, particularly for the population of Stop Out non-respondents with respect to the total NCSU undergraduate population.







The mean GPA for 2018 was 2.9 for respondents, and 2.3 for non-respondents, indicating a difference in these Stop Out 2018 populations.

Figure 3. Race/Ethnicity of 2018 Stop Out Respondents, Stop Out Non-Respondents and Overall NCSU Undergraduate Population.






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
Figure 4. Distribution of Students by Academic College for 2018 Stop Out Respondents, Stop Out Non-Respondents and Overall NCSU Undergraduate Population.



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Figure 5. First Generation Status Percentages of 2018 Stop Out Respondents and Stop Out Non-Respondents.





Figure 7. Class Year of 2018 Stop Out Respondents, Stop Out Non-Respondents and Total NCSU Undergraduate Population.





% Single Most Important Reason Not to Re-enroll




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NC State Experience

Figure 15. Percent of 2018 Stop Out Respondents Who Intended to Complete a Degree from NC State When They First Enrolled at NC State.



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


Figure 16. Percent of 2018 Stop Out Respondents Planning to Return to NC State.





Figure 19. How Much Assistance/Guidance 2018 Stop Out Respondents Sought Out When Deciding not to Re-enroll.



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
